

The Times Higher Education Impact Rankings, which assesses the contribution of universities around the world to sustainable development goals, has been an important source of motivation for us to see our place in the world and measure our contribution with all the activities we carry out for sustainable development as a higher education institution. As Istanbul Medeniyet University, we were included in THE Impact Ranking for the first time in 2021 by applying with only 4 SDGs, while we applied with 11 SDGs for 2024, being ranked 601-800 in the global ranking. The table below shows IMU's continued rise on this ranking.

# 1 NO POVERTY



1 NO POVERTY



Eradicating poverty in all its forms remains one of the greatest challenges facing humanity. While the number of people living in extreme poverty dropped by more than half between 1990 and 2015, too many are still struggling for the most basic human needs.

As of 2015, about 736 million people still lived on less than US\$1.90 a day; many lack food, clean drinking water and sanitation. Rapid growth in countries such as China and India has lifted millions out of poverty, but progress has been uneven. Women are more likely to be

poor than men because they have less paid work, education, and own less property. Progress has also been limited in other regions, such as South Asia and sub-Saharan Africa, which account for 80 percent of those living in extreme poverty. New threats brought on by climate change, conflict and food insecurity, mean even more work is needed to bring people out of poverty.

The SDGs are a bold commitment to finish what we started, and end poverty in all forms and dimensions by 2030. This involves targeting the most vulnerable, increasing basic resources and services, and supporting communities affected by conflict and climate-related disasters.










## Students from Low-income Countries



IMU offer free psychotherapy and counseling services to all our students and staff. In 2024, IMU provided free Health, Psychology Counseling and Guidance services to a total of 610 campus community members. This number was 318 at 2023. Thus, there was a 92% increase in the number of people benefited from free psychotherapy services.


## Number of Students Received a 100% Food Stipend



While the number of admitted students from low-income countries was 313 in 2021, it decreased to 302 in both 2022 and 2023. From 2023 to 2024, the number of admitted students from low-income countries increased from 302 to 411, representing a 36% rise.

This upward trend reflects the University's ongoing progress in promoting equitable access to higher education, fully aligned with its public mission and the national principles of inclusive education.

## Number of People Benefited from Free Psychotherapy Services



To ensure that its students can easily access our food services in an affordable way, all IMU students are given an 80% discount on the regular lunch prices each year. Also, 124 low-income students received a 100% food stipend in 2024. This number increased 24% from 2023.

## **OPERATIONS**

### **University Anti-poverty Programmes**

As per the state laws and regulations that apply the principles of inclusive education, Istanbul Medeniyet University (IMU) as a public higher education institution supports access to higher education for all students from all segments of society, including those from low-income households. In line with these principles, our Turkish students are not required to pay any tuition fees and education is free for all.

Although students are admitted through the national higher education entrance exam based on the sole criterion of academic success, low-income students admitted in IMU are assisted through discounts in housing in the university dormitory, part-time work opportunities, free health, psychology counseling and guidance services and food stipends,.

To address the <u>accommodation</u> needs of our students, we have a dormitory that is open to all low-income students in Istanbul and our students are given a 15% discount in our dormitory.

Low-income students are also offered **part-time work** in various departments of the university outside their class hours. Our part-time student-employees are selected based on their household income and in addition to a monthly income, their insurance costs are also covered by our university throughout their work period. In 2024, we supported a total of 36 students as our part-time employees.

In addition to the free medical care provided by the state, we also offer free <u>psychotherapy and counseling services</u> to all our students and staff. In 2024, we provided free Health, Psychology Counseling and Guidance services to a total of 610 campus community members.



## **OPERATIONS**

To ensure that our students can easily access our food services in an affordable way, all our students are given an 80% discount on the regular lunch prices each year. Also, 124 low-income students received a 100% <u>food stipend</u> in 2024.



IMU has added a new program to the free food support programs it provided for its students. Free tea/coffee and offered <u>cakes</u> have been to our students, thanks to the vending machine system installed in our University Ziraat Bank Library. In IMU continued to provide food support packages to our students with this support program.






### LEARNING



Learning processes are key in achieving SDGs. Thus, universities play a critical role both by training professionals who will prioritize SDGs in their future practices and by increasing local, national, and global capacity to successfully achieve SDGs. As Istanbul Medeniyet University, we are aware of our critical role and therefore, we primarily inform our students, the leaders and decision-makers of the future, about the Sustainable Development Goals through course contents, co-curricular activities and student club activities and strengthen their awareness. For this purpose, each of our faculties and departments prepares SDG-related course contents, including courses that address the Sustainable Development Goals holistically, as well as specific contributions that can be made by the expertise of the relevant professional field in which they provide training. In 2024, 14 bachelor degree courses related to SDG-1 were given at IMU.

IMU Sustainability Club carried out a social responsibility project to eliminate inequalities in early childhood education of vulnerable groups such as children and to ensure that all children have equal access to quality pre-school output of the social education. As an responsibility project "Material Support to Village Schools", which focuses on both waste management and educational equality, finger puppets were presented to preschool education classrooms across Turkey as a gift for April 23rd National Sovereignty and Children's Day.

The project, carried out by the IMU Sustainability Club, was realized in two phases. In the first phase, which focused on the reuse of resources and minimizing the consumption of new by upcycling waste, resources upcycling workshops were organized to design and produce puppets. In 3 workshops held on April 05, April 19 and April 23, participants made puppet designs with waste fabrics, felt and unused materials they brought from their homes. Previously collected waste paper was used to make the puppet molds. With these workshops, over 100 finger puppets were produced and 8 sets of puppets with different themes were prepared.

Following the preparation of the puppets, the IMU Sustainability Club (IMUSUS) made an announcement on social media to reach preschool classes in need of materials, and schools in need because of income inequality were asked to fill out forms with the necessary information. IMUSUS board members evaluated these applications at a meeting held on May 02, 2024 and determined the schools to which the puppets would be sent by considering the locations of schools and preffered schools located in areas dealing with extreme poverty. Furkan ERUÇAR, the club president, stated that in the selection of schools, regions with high socio-economic inequalities, earthquake zones and village schools were prioritized. After the evaluation of the applications, the IMUSUS team presented 8 sets containing a total of 100 puppets to 8 schools in Bitlis, Şanlıurfa, Hatay and Diyarbakır. The gifts, which were packaged with the work of the community members, were mailed to the schools.
